OUTREACH

Dale Heights received a handwritten letter and request from an inmate at Redgranite Correctional Institution in Redgranite Wisconsin for assistance with personal care items. The original handwritten copy is on the sideboard in the Gathering Space along with a copy of the request form.

Donna, our secretary extraordinaire, has checked that this is a legitimate request and a common practice. Outreach would like to consider this request and involve the congregation as well as an opportunity to do this as prison ministry and learn something about correctional life as well.

The request from the inmate:

5/23/23

Dear Dale Heights Presbyterian Church,

My name is Randy Schiff, I am 35 years old, a Christian and current prisoner at the Redgranite prison in Redgranite Wisconsin and would like to explain that I am an indigent person at this time and wanted to know if you can possibly order me some hygiene items from Union Supply?

I am waiting to get a job but the thing about that is jobs around here start at \$.12 hr which is only enough to buy a laundry card every 2 weeks so we can wash our clothes so there's not really much around here for employment opportunities so if this is something that you may be able to help me with then I greatly appreciate it, thank you for your time and consideration on this matter and God bless you all, Sincerely, Randy Schiff If we choose to become involved, the quarterly cost for soap and Degree deodorant will be \$23.00

This is Outreach Committee's recommendation:

Outreach is responsible for the funding and commitment and we will accept \$1.00-\$2.00 donations every 3 months from interested members. - Note on the envelope that the donation is for backpacks and supplies or WayForward and include your name to give you credit for your gift. Please write backpack on your check as well.

The Dale Heights Energy or "Please Turn Out the Lights" Challenge

One of the easiest and most effective ways to save some money and reduce your energy bill is turning off our light when we aren't using them.

First, reducing our energy usage by turning off our lights is an excellent way to reduce our carbon footprint. **Electricity generation is one of the biggest sources of carbon emissions that contribute to climate change.** By turning off our lights when we aren't using them, we can do our part to reduce carbon emissions and therefore help the environment.

And reducing our energy usage doesn't just help the environment – it also helps reduce expenses. Turning off lights when we don't need them can help to reduce our electricity bills. We'll also extend the life of our light bulbs, which will save us money as well.

Turning off our lights when we aren't using them is one of the most basic steps we can take to reduce our energy usage and save money on our electricity bill. Just remember that even a small change can add up to big energy savings for us and also help reduce our carbon footprint.

What are we specifically challenging and asking all of us at Dale Heights to do?

Please...

- Be conscious and ask ourselves if we need to turn on a switch when we use the hall or go in a room
- Turn off hall lights when you are not in the hall
- Turn off bathroom lights when you exit the bathroom
- Turn off a room light when you leave a room
- Turn off the kitchen lights when you leave the kitchen
- Double check bathroom lights when locking up the building to leave
- If the air conditioning or heat has been turned up or down, return it to the original temperature when leaving.

Another reminder is to check to see that all windows are closed and locked when leaving the building.

June is...was pollinator month, but...

Two wonderful young neighbors reminded me again that June is...was pollinator month! Thank you wonderful, curious and informed ones! Let' s get a head start on Pollinator Month 2024. We still have time to add even a couple of pollinator plants to our gardens and yards! Here' s a reminder for all of us:

National Pollinators Month in June brings attention to the importance of the relationship between pollinators and plants. Pollinators are insects and animals that transfer pollen from one plant to another. This pollen transfer leads to plants being able to produce fruits, vegetables, and nuts. Pollination, thus, is a crucial method through which humans and wildlife get their food resources. **Research studies estimate that about 75% of the food sources in the world are dependent on pollination.** However, due to increased pollution and invasive non-native plantations, pollinators like bees and wasps are in danger of extinction.

Must-have plants to help Wisconsin's native bees

One of the more important steps backyard gardeners can take to help disappearing native bees is to grow native plants that provide continuous blooms throughout the season, according to **Susan Carpenter, plant curator at the University of Wisconsin Arboretum.** Carpenter offered these "must haves" for bee conservation, broken down by season. Some of the recommendations are noted as superfoods or immune builders for bumble bees, according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Early season: Virginia bluebells, *Mertensia virginica*, shooting star, *Dodecatheon meadia;* wild lupine, *Lupinus perennis;* wood betony, *Pedicularis canadensis;* serviceberry, *Amelanchier*, willow, *Salix.*

Midseason: white or cream false indigo, *Baptisia alba* or *Baptisia bracteata;* penstemon, *Penstemon;* Culver' s root, *Veronicastrum virginicum*; wild bergamot, *Monarda fistulosa* (superfood and immune builder); purple coneflower, *Echinacea purpurea* or *Echinacea pallida* (superfood); leadplant, *Amorpha canescens* (superfood); common milkweed, *Asclepias syriaca*; American basswood tree, *Tilia americana*. "Do not skip that one. It' s huge, and they love it," Carpenter said.

Late season: bottle gentian, *Gentiana andrewsii;* showy goldenrod, *Solidago speciosa* (superfood); New England aster, *Aster novae-angliae* (superfood); white turtlehead, *Chelone glabra* (immune builder).

For additional recommendations, Prairie Nursery in Westfield has a handy online native flower and shrub guide for season-long pollinator support that specifically lists species of bees, *prairienursery.com*.

There are also many trees, shrubs and native plants which effectively contribute to a healthier ecosystem!.
